Deprivation of Liberty Safeguards

What are they?

- Mental Capacity Act 2005.
- Safeguards for people supported in Care Homes/Hospitals.
- 2009 ECHR 'Bournewood Judgement'
- Human Rights Act 'Article 5 Right to Liberty'

Who do they support?

- People over 18 who have a mental disorder such as dementia or Learning Disability.
- Who lack capacity to agree to care and accommodation arrangements.
- There is additional provision for young people from the age of 16.



Deprivation of Liberty Safeguards

What are the rules?

- Minimum of 2 assessors (one Best Interests Assessor)
- DoL can be agreed for a *maximum* of 12 months
- A person must have a Representative appointed
- A review if there's a change in circumstances /regain capacity
- Local Authority 'signatory' must authorise
- Objections to be considered by Court of Protection
- Only the CoP can prevent or restrict contact with friends and family.



Considering Capacity

Adult voice, wishes and feelings



- There is clear guidance regarding considering capacity
- person is unable to make a particular decision at a particular time and their mind or brain is affected by illness of disability.
- Four stage test: Understand, Retain, weigh, communicate
- Previous wishes and feelings any advance decisions?
- Current wishes and feelings
- A person must have a Representative appointed
- Decisions should be made in best interests
- Proportionate/Least restrictive

Life in residential care- James Brown



- James is a 29 he has lived in Sunnyfields care home for 5 years.
- James needs support with all areas of his life and access to the community. James may need support at any time of the day or night
- James has an advocate, likes the care staff and gets on well with other residents.
- James has a DoLS in place for up to a year.



Life in residential care- Mrs Elsie Summers

- Elsie is 89 and has an advanced dementia illness.
- She has recently moved into a care home where John, her husband visits daily and is her representative.
- Elsie often appears to be quite distressed and anxious and tries to leave. Elsie wishes to return 'home' to her parents.



- DoL authorised for 4 weeks, due to the distress Elsie experiences.
- Everyone agrees it is best interests for Elsie to stay in the care home.
- Court of Protection must agree this deprivation as Elsie is 'objecting'.

Community DoLs



Deprivation of Liberty Safeguards extend into the community – the process is a little different.

- Deprivations identified through ongoing work with people and their families
- Social Workers complete documentation for the Court of Protection
- Legal Team then issue this to Court of Protection
- Maximum of twelve months authorisation can be authorised
- Reviewed annually or if a person's circumstances change

Living with a 'community DoLs' – Mr David Close

- David is 78 and has advanced dementia, his memory loss is significant, and he is continually supported through 24 hours to promote his safety and wellbeing.
- David lives at home with his wife Jenny and attends an activity and wellbeing centre twice per week.
- Jenny ensures the doors are always locked to prevent David from leaving their home without her.



Jenny a friend or carer are always around to help David understand where he is.

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- Everyone agrees it is best interests for David to stay remain at home with Jenny.
- Court of Protection must agree this deprivation as this is a community DoL
